¹Act 81 of 2021 ("Act 81") temporarily amended some aspects of off-premises catering permits through Dec. 31, 2024. Under Act 81, an application fee is not required and the licensee does not have to submit the application prior to March 1 of that calendar year. The five-hour limit for each catered function and the 52 functions per calendar year are removed under Act 81.
